Please consider the questions on this application carefully. Complete every field, even if the answer is “I don’t know.” We are all learning together to share our lives with these fascinating and challenging companions and no one has all of the answers.

Before completing this application . . .

Parrots, when exhibiting natural behaviors, can be loud, destructive, and messy and require a tremendous amount of time and attention. To have a successful relationship, you must learn about the wild nature of parrots and be willing to make potential change in your home environment and your behavior. We are here to help, but parrot care is a big commitment. Consider how flexible your family is and whether a parrot is truly a good choice.

Note: If it has been more than a year since any birds already in the home have had veterinary checkups, or if they are not yet a year old and haven't yet had an exam, an exam from an avian veterinarian will need to be completed in most cases before a new bird is placed in the home.	
Adopters, do you agree to take this parrot for regular check-ups with blood work?	
If you have other parrots, do you understand the quarantine process and will your household accommodate separation of birds?	
Some cookware, plants, and cleaners are toxic to birds. Please list some that are dangerous for birds.	

HOUSING INFORMATION:	Please answer all questions so we can make a match for your family.
Describe the location of the parrot's cage. What room will it be in? Where in the room will the cage be placed? What will the cage contain (perches, toys)? What other parrots will be in the same room?	
Describe how much mobility the parrot will have. Will it leave its cage? Go to other rooms? Eat with the family? Have a play gym?	
Are you able to allow a bird to safely fly in your home? Or, is your preference to keep a bird clipped?	
<p><u>Our recommended MINIMUM width and depth CAGE STANDARDS</u> (WITHOUT seed skirts - so, space for the bird him/herself):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Parakeets, Cockatiels, Lovebirds, Quakers: 27" w x 24" d - Ringnecks, Conures, Pionus, Lories, Meyers, Senegals, Multiple Small Birds: 32" w X 23" d - African Greys, Small Cockatoos, Eclectus, Amazons, Small Macaws: 36" w x 28" d 	

- Umbrella cockatoo, Greater Sulfur Crested cockatoo, Triton cockatoo, Moluccan cockatoo, Military macaw, Scarlet macaw, Blue and gold macaw: 40"w x 30"d
 - Greenwing or Hyacinth Macaws: 48"w x 36"d
 We REALLY recommend the 64"w x 32"d or 80"w x 40"d "double" cages for even a single large bird.

Adopting families that already have birds may want to check to see if their current cages meet these minimum requirements as well.

<p>Budgerigars: \$25 Lovebirds, cockatiels: \$50 Parrotlets, lories/lorikeets: \$100 Quakers, ringnecks, conures: \$200 Senegals, meyers, caiques: \$300 Amazons, pionus, jardine's, mini-macaws: \$350 Cockatoos, eclecticus: \$400 African greys, large macaws: \$500</p>	
Are you willing to pay an adoption fee? This is the only way that we can sustain our program services. See our standard fees above. NOTE: There is no fee while you are fostering the bird. The fee is paid when the adoption is finalized.	
It is very likely that even an adopted parrot will need another home in the future, as they live a long time and our lives often change unexpectedly. <i>All parrots remain under the legal guardianship and protection of Phoenix Landing, so if an adopted parrot needs a home after yours, you must contact Phoenix Landing so that we can find the parrot's next new home. Do you understand and agree to this?</i> [We are generally happy to adopt to a family member who has an existing relationship with the bird, but would need an updated adoption contract signed at that time and my request class attendance, depending on the situation.]

Adopting or Fostering a Parrot from Phoenix Landing

Thank you for your interest in adopting a parrot from Phoenix Landing. Please review the following before you complete and return the Parrot Match questionnaire.

Living with a parrot may be one of the most challenging and rewarding experiences of your life, and parrots demand patience and dedication from their guardians.

Phoenix Landing remains strongly committed to the welfare of the birds relinquished to us. The following process has been designed to guarantee that every parrot in our care will be placed in a permanent, or long-term, caring home.

This process is also intended to ensure that birds obtained through Phoenix Landing will remain under the legal custody of Phoenix Landing. It is also intended to ensure that when a bird adopted through Phoenix Landing needs its next new home, as many of our Phoenix Landing birds will need, it will be returned to Phoenix Landing for its next home.

Steps of the Adoption Process

1. Complete and return the Parrot Match questionnaire.
2. Attend a class that satisfies our adoption process requirement. Free classes are offered monthly in several locations, and provide you with up-to-date standards of parrot care. Check the Events page of www.phoenixlanding.org for details about classes that meet the adoption requirement (marked with an *), We encourage everyone to attend a behavior class as well, particularly for those adopting larger birds.
3. Have a home visit to further personalize the match making process. We want to ensure a great placement from the start! We urge that all household members be present during the home visit, because this is a family decision.
4. The Adoption Coordinator uses the information in this questionnaire and the home visit to find parrots who are good candidates for your family and sends you information about them.
5. A parrot is placed with you for a two month foster period.
6. If you decide to adopt at the end of two months, you sign an adoption agreement and pay the associated fee.

Why Do We Charge Adoption Fees?

Please Note: For most birds, THERE IS AN ADOPTION FEE. This includes and may not be limited to the cost of medical care and treatment. Many of our birds have additional tests for diseases or other procedures, depending on their environment prior to relinquishment. Most of our parrots also have a blood chemistry tests performed. Vet costs vary with birds depending on their general health and basic condition. If we did not have fees, we could not sustain our adoption program and services. Please do not make it difficult for our Adoption Coordinators to work with you on this issue when it is time to make the adoption decisions.

NOTE: If you have other parrots (including budgies) in the home, we strongly recommend that they have been vetted in the last year for more than just wing or nail trims. Most avian vets recommend an exam once a year, and this often includes bloodwork.

A Note About Cages. . .

Sometimes Phoenix Landing must purchase and assign a new cage for a bird, and that cost would need to be paid at adoption. We do our best to find and use donated cages whenever possible, but that option is not always available. If a bird is temporarily housed in a donated cage, you may be required to purchase a new

cage (not required to do so through Phoenix Landing) for the bird and return the donated one to Phoenix Landing.

We believe that all parrots deserve the largest cage possible. Round cages are never appropriate for any parrot. Parrots should only be housed in environments that give them lots of room for flapping and foraging; room for a wide variety of perches (cloth, wood, rope, etc.); multiple feed dishes to encourage activity and natural foraging instincts; and bar spacing that is an appropriate size. They also deserve and need plenty of time outside the cage.

Adoption Fees Effective January 1, 2021

- Budgerigars: \$25
- Lovebirds, cockatiels: \$50
- Parrotlets, lorries/lorikeets: \$100
- Quakers, ringnecks, conures: \$200
- Senegals, meyers, caiques: \$300
- Amazons, pionus, jardine's, mini-macaws: \$350
- Cockatoos, eclecticus: \$400
- African greys, large macaws: \$500

NOTE: Our adoption fees are standardized to help us cover our adoption and education program costs. Like any other organization, we certainly could not perform these services without adequate funds. However, these fees do not cover our program costs, we rely on contributions from kind donors to sustain our overall efforts. So when you submit this application, we expect that you will respect and appreciate that we have these fees for good reason, and no one benefits from our revenues but the parrots. We do not consider birds as commodities and do not like to argue about money!

◆ Umbrella Cockatoo, Greater Sulphur Cockatoo, Triton Cockatoo, Rose-Breasted Cockatoo, Mollucan Cockatoo, Military Macaw, Scarlet Macaw, Blue and Gold Macaw	40w x 30d
◆ Greenwing or Hyacinth Macaw	48w x 36d
